## 50 years of improving the services for the elderly

- Established by the providers in 1967,
- Our members are operating 85 out of 100 residential facilities for elderly and persons with problems in mental health,
- Our members have 18.513 out of 20.878 beds in Slovenia,
- New members are joining us every year this shows that we are doing good work and contributing to the system.

#### Slovenia

- Every four years, life expectancy is increased for a year, and the number of people over 80 years of age is rising at 3x speed.
- Elderly over 65 years are representing 19.1% of the total population in 2017.
- According to a rough estimate, one employed Slovenian covers the expenses for 2.1 pensioners.

### **Elderly care system**

- Residential care 18.600 beds for elderly, 2000 beds for adults with problems in mental health
- 60% of beds are ran by public providers
- Day care
- Social care at home
- GREY market



## **Residential care in Slovenia**

- A mixture of hospitals for elderly and long term care facilties
- We cater in the same facilities
  - elderly who want to enjoy ther golden years,
  - and people who need assistance or health care in their last few weeks.
- They all cover the costs in same way, no matter the cause they need our services.

- Most of them in public facilities.
- After 2021 2 bed room will be standard.
